

Paving the Way... March Levy Proposal

The most widely utilized asset in our township are our roadways, from quiet neighborhood streets to busy commercial thoroughfares, all of us rely on The Perry Township Road Department to keep our roads safe, clean, and maintained. As with many aspects of life, as time goes on, costs rise, and in the case of our Road Department their budget has remained stagnant for nearly a decade. The harsh reality is that at the current funding amount paving is limited to 5 to 7 miles per year and it will continue to decline without an increase in income. Frankly, this is not a level of service that we can be proud of.

THE TEAM & THE PLAN

Your Perry Township Board of Trustees, Anthony Davide (Public Works Director), and Glen Reichenbach (Road Levy Chair) aim to make an immediate impact on the issues facing our township through a Levy Proposal for the March 19th election. The Levy will address three key elements to efficiently use tax dollars and maximize the visibly of the community's investment.



THE BIG THREE

Paving: Over the past two paving seasons the township utilized Covid Relief (ARPA) funds to pave nearly a third of its roads and we need to "Finish the Job." This levy would provide funding that would pave the remaining 100 miles in 5 years or less. This will result in all township roads with new asphalt. **Snow Removal & Response:** When we encounter a snow event it is all-hands-on-deck for our Road Department, often with a middle of the night call-in. The deployment of our plowing fleet with current amount of manpower requires over 10 hours to clear all streets. This levy will result in a 20% reduction in plowing time by the addition of two Road Maintenace employees and updating the plowing equipment.

ISSUE 18!

Drainage Projects: Stormwater management is a perpetual hot topic. Large (whole neighborhood) projects are undertaken through partnerships with Stark Regional Planning and Ohio Public Works Commision, levy dollars will provide an increase matching funds and the ability to participate in more projects. Also, the paving plan that is a part of this package will require a large-scale lateral (under-road) pipe replacement program that will be completed ahead of the new asphalt.

UNDERSTANDING & ACCOUNTABILITY

The consideration of our residents on March 19, 2024, will be to have the opportunity to vote on Issue 18, a replacement of 1.00 mill on an existing levy and an increase of 6.8 mills. Our County Auditor estimates this will generate an estimated \$5,783,000 annually, at a rate not to exceed 7.8 mills for each \$1 of taxable value. This is an estimate of \$273.00 per \$100,000 valuation.

Before March 19th, there will be efforts to make the Levy needs and financial details clear by providing opportunities to build understanding through social media, in-person meetings, and printed materials. The Perry Road Levy Committee encourages you to ask questions as we want to be as transparent as possible with our Perry Township residents.

One More Promise: There are two levies expiring for the Road Department, one in 2024 and the other in 2025. With the successful replacement and increase in 2024, your Road Department plans to let the other levy expire and vows to stay off the ballot for new money for at least 10 years! When given the chance to deliver on these improvement opportunities, our Road Department will be on the forefront of a "Promises Made, Promises Kept" campaign to make your investment visible, tangible, and something the residents of Perry Township can be proud of.

months has been spent placing new personnel at several leadership positions including Police Chief, Public Works Director, and Deputy Fire Chief. Other irons in the fire include the pursuit for grant



Happy New Year! I hope you all have had a wonderful holiday season with your family and friends. As we have begun the new year, I wanted to take the opportunity to thank our residents for their continued support. We look forward to enhancing and providing outstanding services to the residents of Perry Township. Here are a few tips to help you to have a great start to the new year.

As winter is in full swing, even a minimal amount of snow on the ground can cause your vehicle to slide out of control. Ice can be very hard to see on certain roadways and can be hazardous when driving. Please be aware and vigilant when driving on the roadways when snow and ice are factors. Slow down and give yourself plenty of room behind other vehicles when these hazards are present to avoid accidents.

It is always important when ODOT and township plow vehicles are on the roadways to remain behind the plow vehicles at least 100-200 feet while plowing and dispensing salt. Never pass a plow truck on the right because the winged blade plows typically throw the snow to the right side of the roadway when they are out clearing them. Use caution even when the roads have been cleared by plows, as wet and icy road conditions can remain.

Safety tips to prepare your vehicle for Winter

Preparation

- Install winter windshield wipers, this includes a rugged and durable winter wiper blade that combats severe weather conditions.
- Mount winter tires on your vehicle, they have a better grip for wet and unstable road conditions.
- Keep washer fluid full, fill fluid to the line marked full. If you do not have a line, fill it to about two inches below the cap.
- Pack a winter safety kit. This should include:
- Extra warm clothes (Insulated winter coat, gloves, knit cap or beanie, socks, winter boots) Emergency thermal blankets Disposable band warmers

Disposable hand warmers Emergency phone charger Jumper cables Emergency car battery charger Flashlights and/or lanterns Flares Hazard lights or triangles Windshield scraper and a small shovel Kitty litter, sand, and/or road salt First Aid Kit Food (granola/protein bars, nuts) Water

Service your vehicle regularly.

- Maintain proper tire pressure.
- Clean all debris from your vehicle.
- Keep your rear-window defroster in working order.

SENIORS STAYING CONNECTED

SENIOR WATCH PROGRAM

Seniors can sign up or be signed up for these programs by filling out an application that can be obtained through the link provided or at the Police Department. This application requests important information and specifies what program the individual would like to be enrolled in. There are two separate options. The least intrusive is the "COP CARE CALL" and the most all-inclusive program is the "SENIOR WATCH."

The COP CARE CALL program includes phone calls to enrolled senior citizens from the Police Department on designated days and times, (weekdays between 8AM and 4PM). A member of our department will call the individual to check on their well-being. Three attempts will be made. If no contact is made, Officers will then be sent to their home for a welfare check.

The SENIOR WATCH program is for senior citizens that may need our help more than others. These individuals may not have nearby family or friends to check on them or assist them if needed. This program assigns an Officer to visit the individual once a week (or more if needed) to check on their welfare.

Once the application is completed and forwarded to the Police Department, it will be entered into a database. From there, a schedule will be set up for the individual based on the program selected.

The Perry Township Police Department values its residents and believes in strengthening our relationships with them.

Driving Tips

- Keep your windows, head and taillights clear of snow and ice.
- If you turn your windshield wipers on, turn on your headlights, IT'S THE LAW!
- Keep your gas tank half a tank full to prevent fuel line freeze up.
- Leave adequate amount of stopping time between you and the driver in front of you, braking distance can be a significant amount greater on snowy, icy surfaces.
- Drive using extreme caution on bridges and overpasses during freezing temperatures because bridges can be 5-6 degrees colder than roadways.

If you become stranded remain in your vehicle for shelter. Call for help, you can also tie a bright colored cloth to the vehicle's driver side door handle or outside mirror. Keep the exhaust pipe clear of snow. Poisonous gases can filter into the vehicle if it is clogged. Do not run the engine and heater more than 10 minutes every hour, leaving a window slightly open for ventilation. Light a flare or turn on a flashlight to let others know you are stranded in the vehicle. Utilize your emergency kit as needed. Remain calm.

PTFD at PHS Career Day

Winter Fire Safety

Winter has arrived and regardless if you use a furnace, fireplace, portable heater, wood burner, or any combination of these to keep toasty during this frigid time of the year, please do it safely. The following are some general safety tips to keep you safe as you stay warm during these winter months.

Fireplace

- Make sure you have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually by a professional.
- Be certain the damper or flue is open before starting a fire. Keeping the damper or flue open until the fire is out will draw smoke out of the house. Do not close the damper until the embers have completely stopped burning.
- Use dry and well-aged wood. Wet or green wood causes more smoke and contributes to soot buildup in the chimney. Dried wood burns with less smoke and burns more evenly.
- Make sure the area around the fireplace is clear of anything potentially flammable (furniture, drapes, newspapers, books, etc.). If these items get too close to the fireplace, they could catch fire.
- Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace to prevent embers or sparks from jumping out and starting a fire.
- Before you go to sleep or leave your home put the fire out completely.
- Put ashes in a metal container with a lid. Store the container outside at least 3 feet from your home.
- Keep a watchful eye on your children.
- · Keep a fire extinguisher on hand.

Portable Heaters

- Place the heater on a hard, level, and nonflammable surface. These appliances are intended to sit on the floor, not on a table.
- Keep the space heater at least 3 feet away from combustible materials, such as furniture, bedding, and curtains.
- Make sure to plug them directly into the outlet.

Furnace / Hot Water Tank


- Don't store items any closer than 3 feet to your furnace.
- The best thing you can do to ensure furnace safety is to have your furnace serviced annually by an HVAC professional.

General

- Do not overload outlets.
- Use battery-powered candles.
- Never use charcoal or gasoline devices indoors.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking.
- Close your doors when sleeping.
- If there is a fire, stay low and go! GET OUT!
- Have an escape plan and a safe meeting place.

Address signs are very important to help us find your residence or business in the event of an emergency. Our address signs are made from highly reflective materials that aluminate when light hits them. Light from headlights or even our emergency lights makes the sign extremely visible.

Mark Murphy is a professional, respected, valuable member of the Perry Township Fire Department and has been dedicated to serving the residents of Perry Township for 27 years. He began his career as a volunteer and was hired full-time to fill the vacancy in Fire Prevention in 2022. Since he has taken over the role of Fire Prevention he has truly excelled. Fire Prevention is something he always had an interest in and when asked he will tell you he loves his job, and his enthusiasm definitely proves it. Since day one Mark has been dedicated to the position. He stepped into the role with very little guidance, therefore, he needed to organize his record-keeping, determine the number of businesses in our Township, determine when they were last inspected, when he was going to inspect them, and when he would complete his re-inspections if needed all while designing and implementing Fire Prevention programs for our schools and nursing homes and businesses.

The records were transitioned from paper to an electronic version. This provides better tracking and searching capabilities. Mark has worked closely with the Township Zoning Inspector, and together they have compiled an updated the list of the businesses located in Perry Township. This is extremely important as it provides valuable statistical information as well as the types of businesses we have in our area. We utilized previous records to update inspection information. Businesses are inspected yearly. If violations are encountered, a re-inspection is required. This is where Mark's professionalism and personality come into play, mainly because he is telling them they have things that need to be fixed. Our fire safety programs provide a wealth of information to students and employees so they have a better understanding of what to do should the need arise.

Why is all this important? All of these are necessary to educate employees and students and to keep the patrons and businesses safe. Fire safety is

End of Year Recap

2023 WAS A BUSY YEAR FOR THE PERRY TOWNSHIP ZONING


DEPARTMENT. As of early December we processed over 300 permits, otherwise known as zoning certificates, and handled over 500 nuisance cases in the township. Several new businesses have come into Perry Township and many, many residents have made improvements to residential properties with such things as storage sheds, garages, swimming pools and home additions.

Three blighted properties were removed at the end of the summer in partnership with the Stark County Land Reutilization Corporation. Moving forward, the Zoning Department will target approximately 2 to 5 blighted or abandoned commercial and residential properties each year for review and removal. The parcels on which these structures stand can then be improved through resale and other improvements.

We have been working hard to control the unauthorized placement of business signs at intersections and along our right of way streets throughout the township. As a reminder, posting these signs in random locations throughout the township is not permitted. Also, you may not be aware that posting signs on any utility pole is actually an action subject to possible citation by the local utility company as these signs and the various types of fasteners used to hang them often pose a safety hazard for utility workers.

It is my pleasure to serve as the zoning inspector for Perry Township and I look forward to another year of positive changes in 2024.

Paving and Drainage

PAVING: With the help of the ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds, the Perry Road Department was able to pave approximately 25 miles of road in 2023. Prior to 2023, the department averaged approximately 6 miles of paving over the last five-year period. Unfortunately, due to the sky-rocketing costs of road resurfacing and asphalt, the cost to pave a mile of roadway has risen by over 95%. This year, the cost to pave a mile of roadway reached an all-time high of \$165,000.00, compared to only \$85,000 in the year 2018. Not only have resurfacing costs risen, but so have daily construction costs like pipes, blocks, brick, cement, and signs have seen a 40% increase. As we enter 2024, we have a budget for approximately five miles of road.

DRAINAGE: The Plymouth Knolls Phase 2 Storm Sewer System Project is almost complete. We are working with AEP to rerun some of their underground power lines that need to be relocated so we can install the last parts of the drainage pipe on that project.

The Canton Water Department's OPWC (Ohio Public Works Commission) grant has been approved to begin working on Tioga, 4th St, Oneida N.W. & Mohawk. Work will begin in August, 2024 with completion of the project in the fall.

Mailbox Damage

On occasion, a plow truck may accidentally knock over a mailbox, either from the weight of the snow or the plow hitting it. We operate on the assumption that individual mailboxes have been installed and maintained by the homeowner and are capable of withstanding the impact of thrown snow. This is the homeowner's responsibility.



Repairs will not be made to mailboxes that are improperly installed or maintained. Boxes down from snowplow throwing will be re-fastened if possible. Boxes down to deteriorated materials will be the homeowner's responsibility. Mailbox repair will not take place until the current snow operations are finished.

Please fill out a **mailbox complaint form** which is posted at www.perrytwp.com. Look under the Road Department, and click on Mailbox Damage Complaint/Replacement Procedure. Mail your completed form to the Road Department within three (3) days of the mishap. Also, please call in to inform us of the incident, our hours are Monday through Friday, 7a.m.-3p.m., at 330-832-7750.



SNOW PARKING BANS

The Perry Township Board of Trustees has established a snow parking ban on all Township streets whenever snow has accumulated, or is expected to accumulate, to a depth of two (2) or more inches. This ban is for the safety of our plow drivers, safety services/first responders and the traveling public. This will also increase the plow drivers ability to clear the roads at a faster pace. Vehicles parked in the street create inefficient and hazardous snowplowing conditions. Violation of the ban can cause your vehicle to be towed away and stored. The snow parking ban will be advertised over Nixle, social media, and the Perry Township website (www.perrytwp.com). Basketball hoops should be moved off the road, if not, the department has been instructed to

plow around any hoops that have not been removed.

The road department's snow and ice control has a fleet of eleven full time drivers to maintain over 150 miles of roadway (over 300 lane miles). On each route, there is a first and last street to be servcied. We appreciate your patience in this as we know it is very frustrating. The snow plow will make one pass to open the roads, then they WILL be back to open it up more. Our plow drivers cannot control the run off of snow from the plow blade that accumulates in front of your driveway. During major storms, it can take our snow plow drivers 13-16 hours to clear ALL

To help assist the snow plow drivers in maneuvering around in the snow, please consider installing plow markers to help our drivers determine possible obstacles such as turf, curves, and downspout drains. Your local hardware store should have these in stock.

roadways, after the snow has stopped! Yhe priority of snowplow drivers is to clear main roads first, followed by secondary roads, and lastly dead ends and cul-de-sacs.

- Please remember to remove all vehicles, trash cans and basketball hoops from the roadway to your private drive during all snow and ice events.
- Please do not throw snow back into roadways from driveways or sidewalks.
- Trim trees so branches do not extend beyond the back of the curb or roadway.
- Do not pile snow in front of fire hydrants.
- Properly secure your mailbox.
- Wait to shovel your driveway until plows have completed their final pass.

Perry Township Road Construction – Stark County Engineer Projects

The Stark County Engineer's Office (SCEO) had a busy year in 2023, including several resurfacing projects in Perry Township. The following roads were resurfaced:

- Carmont Ave. from Elton St. to Pigeon Run Ave. Hot Mix Asphalt
- 12th St. from Jackson Ave. to Perry Drive Hot Mix Asphalt
- Perry Dr. from Faircrest St. to Southway St. Microsurfacing

2024 promises to be an even busier year for our office in Perry Township, with several large projects on our schedule to begin this coming year.

On 12th St. and Summerdale Ave. we will replace two bridge structures, as well as resurface a portion of Summerdale Ave. between Marion Ave. and 12th St. This project is a joint project between our office and the Perry Township Board of Trustees, and has been a long time in the planning stage, pending funding. With the help of Perry Township we were able to secure funding from the Ohio Public Works Commission to partially fund the project.

This structure and the one on Summerdale will be replaced with reinforced concrete box

culverts. The total cost of the project is estimated at \$ 1 million dollars, with \$740,000 coming form Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) funding. Additionally, in 2024, the Perry Local School District will be constructing turn lanes and providing a traffic signal at the entrance to the new elementary school on Southway Street.

Finally, our largest project in Perry Township in 2024 involves the reconstruction

of Perry Drive between Southway St. and Tuscarawas St. (SR 172). This section of Perry Drive was last improved in the 1970s and the existing curb and gutter, sidewalk and storm sewer system have reached the end of their service life. The project will consist of adding a Two Way Left Turn Lane (center lane) on Perry Drive between 15th St. SW and Tuscarawas St. to tie into the project completed by the Ohio Dept. of Transportation on Tuscarawas St. recently.

Area residents may have already noticed utility poles on the west side of Perry Dr. have been relocated, and aerial utilities are moving currently. Starting in January 2024 other utility relocations including gas lines will be relocated. The project, currently estimated to cost approximately \$ 4.5 million dollars will begin in May or June of 2024. We expect the project to continue into the 2025 construction season and be completed in late summer 2025. Also included in the project is new water lines (City of Canton), new sidewalk, lighting, curb and gutter, storm sewer and road resurfacing. A signal, at the intersection of Perry Dr. and 13th St. will also be provided. Maintenance of traffic will be a tremendous challenge on this project. In order to give the highway contractor sufficient room to work in a very tight corridor,

traffic will be restricted to one direction (Southbound) for much of the project.

Funding for the Perry Drive project will come from federal highway funding available through SCATS (Stark County Area Transportation Study) and a grant from the Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) as well as our offices.


